EPA awards \$2 million in Columbia Basin restoration grants

The Environmental Protection Agency announced Sept. 16 that it is <u>awarding</u>



over \$2 million in grants to 14 organizations, universities, and government agencies to reduce and assess toxics affecting the Columbia River Basin watershed.

These grants are the first from the Columbia River Basin Restoration Funding Assistance Program, which was established by Congress in 2016 in part to reduce toxics that have long affected the health of

the waters throughout the basin.


The Columbia River Basin Restoration Program was created through an amendment to the Clean Water Act. It established both a Funding Assistance Program and a working group made up of state governments, tribal governments, industry representatives, and others.

PNWA started working on the concept of this program with EPA, the Lower Columbia River Estuary Partnership, Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission, and others in 2011. After years of lobbying Congressional delegation members and staffers, we are incredibly gratified to see this idea authorized, funded, and now finally directed toward on-the-ground work.

Corps seeks comments on proposed NWP rulemaking

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is seeking public comments on <u>proposed rulemaking for its Nationwide Permits</u>. NWPs authorize certain activities under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act and Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899.

The Corps is proposing to reissue its existing NWPs and associated general conditions and definitions, with some modifications. They are also proposing to issue five new NWPs.



Two of those proposed new NWPs would authorize certain categories of mariculture activities (i.e., seaweed and finfish) that are not authorized by NWP 48. They are proposing to divide the current NWP 12 that authorizes utility line activities into three separate NWPs, modifying the current NWP to authorize only oil and natural gas pipeline activities, and proposing two new NWPs to authorize activities associated with the construction, maintenance, repair, and removal of electric utility lines/telecommunication lines and utility lines that convey water, sewage, and other substances.

The fifth proposed new NWP would authorize discharges of dredged or fill material into jurisdictional waters for the construction, expansion, and maintenance of water reuse and reclamation facilities.

PNWA Member Van Ness Feldman provided a <u>brief summary of the pre-publication</u> <u>document</u> in August. Comments on the formally published document are due by Nov.
